Youth 13 & Under – Age as of January 1, 2022

Amateur - An exhibitor/competitor who engages in this activity as a pastime/hobby/sport, rather than a profession

Open - An exhibitor/competitor who engages in this activity as a pastime/hobby/sport, or as a profession

Green Horse – Open division for any horse with limited horse show experience

Fees

Office Fee - \$10/horse & rider combination

Entry Fee - \$6/GSC Member \$10/Non-Member

Points & Awards

Points for each class will be awarded according to placings as follows:

Ribbons for 1st through 6th place will be awarded for every class.

High point and reserve high point awards for each division will be given at the end of the show series. To be eligible for end of the series high point, a horse/rider combination must participate in at least two of the ranch shows. Should there be any ties, End of Day placings from the final show of the series will be used to break ties.

Rules

Tack

A western saddle should be used. Saddles and other equipment should be suitable for ranch work. We encourage and promote good working tack. Silver on saddles should be limited.

Back Numbers

Each exhibitor must wear an exhibitor number that was assigned from the office. The number may be worn on the exhibitors back OR placed on the side of the saddle pad. Failure to have a back number while showing will result in a disqualification for that class.

Attire

In all classes it is required that exhibitors wear traditional western attire that reflects the true ranch lifestyle. Appropriate western attire includes a long sleeve shirt with collar that has buttons or snaps that must be fastened at the wrist, a western hat and boots with heels. Long pants are required as well as either a hat or helmet. The addition of any protective outerwear such as jackets or a vest is acceptable as dictated by weather conditions.

Ranch Pleasure

All horses are judged solely working on the rail at the walk, trot and lope both directions of the ring. An extension of the walk, trot or lope may be called for at the judge's discretion, as well as a back. The true ranch horse will have a free flowing stride of reasonable length in relation to his conformation and cover a reasonable amount of ground with little effort. The horse should have a balanced, free flowing motion that is exhibited through all gaits with proper cadence and rhythm. Exhibitors will not be penalized for picking up the reins or moving the horse's body if the horse is soft and willing. A willing horse will not swish their tail or be blatantly disobedient to the rider's cues and aids. The horse should drive off his hind quarters using it as a driving force for his body. Horses should not carry their heads behind the vertical, giving the appearance of intimidation nor be excessively nosed out, giving the appearance of resistance.

Ranch Riding

The purpose of the Ranch Riding horse should reflect the versatility, attitude, and movement of a working horse. The horse's performance should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and that of a working ranch horse. This class should show the horse's ability to work at a forward, working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse shall not be shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners and responsiveness of the horse while performing the maneuver requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations. The required maneuvers will include the walk, trot, and lope both directions; as well as stops, and a back. Additional maneuvers might include a side pass, turns of 360 degrees or more, change of lead (simple or flying), walk, trot, or lope over a pole(s); or some reasonable combination of maneuvers that would be reasonable for a ranch horse to perform. Each contestant will perform the required pattern individually and separately.

Reining

Reining is a judged event designed to show the athletic ability of the horse in the confines of a show arena. To rein a horse is not only to guide him, but also to control his every movement. The best reined horse should be willfully guided or controlled with little or no apparent resistance. There are eight (8) ARHA approved reining patterns that may be used. Pattern will be selected by judge/show management. Each contestant will perform the required pattern individually and separately. All horses will be judged immediately upon entering the arena and judging will cease after the last maneuver. Any fault incurred prior to the commencement of a pattern will be scored accordingly.

Trail

This class will be judged on the performance of the horse over obstacles with emphasis on manners, response to the rider and quality of movement. Credit will be given to horses negotiating the obstacles with style and some degree of speed, providing correctness is not sacrificed. Horses should receive credit for showing attentiveness to the obstacles and the capability of picking their own way through the course when obstacles warrant it, and willingly responding to the rider's cues on more difficult obstacles. Courses will be developed by the show manager and obstacles will allow the ranch horse to demonstrate its capability to work in a ranch type setting.

PLEASE NOTE:

Judge's decisions are final as are show management decisions. These open shows are intended to have a "fun" and relaxed atmosphere. Exhibitors that violate these rules or display erratic or vulgar behavior will be dismissed from the show grounds immediately & are submitted to forfeiting any points earned for that day!
